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Parkinson Québec continues to grow by empowering people facing Parkinson's disease.

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Word from the Chair and the Executive Director

We began 2018 by moving offices, which gave us a sense of renewal. Our new space is better adapted and brighter, which energizes and empowers our team more than ever.

This new location combined with our "Unisson" awareness campaign in 2017 allowed us to enhance our visibility and accessibility during this 18th year in service of people living with Parkinson's disease and their caregivers.

During 2018, we continued to professionalize our team and we gave serious consideration to the effectiveness of our processes and impact of our services in order to align them with the needs of the Parkinson's community.

We had 592 respondents to the survey conducted with the Parkinson's community: an important step in the needs analysis that allowed us to understand the needs and concerns of people touched by Parkinson's disease. We are in the process of implementing an approach centred on a continuum of services and our new programs will be developed around this concept.

We want to express our esteem and gratitude to everyone who contributed to the success of 2018. We are referring to the people who told us their needs, who used our services as well as the many committed volunteers all over the province, our loyal donors and the members of our permanent staff. 

Getting to know the **Parkinson's Community**

For guidance in developing its services, Parkinson Québec conducted a survey on six areas of concern. This made it possible to determine the needs of people living with the disease and their caregivers across Quebec.

Access to the healthcare system In conjunction with its survey and in order to develop an even more detailed picture of the Quebec Parkinson's community, Parkinson Québec partnered with the Institut national de santé publique du Québec (INSPQ) to produce the pamphlet, "Parkinsonism including Parkinson's disease: Overview in Quebec". This document reports on the frequency of parkinsonism, including Parkinson's disease, in Quebec, among people aged 40 years old and over. It also describes how people use healthcare and services.

Renewed approach

Every person touched by Parkinson's disease is unique and has their own story. Parkinson's disease progresses at a different pace for each person and the impact of the symptoms is just as unique.

Parkinson Québec believes that people living with Parkinson's should not have to face the disease alone. We think that if they are well supported, they can maintain a satisfactory quality of life and continue to achieve in various aspects of their life.

Parkinson Québec's services are now oriented around the individual and their journey. They are part of a continuum in which the person touched by Parkinson's is supported, regardless of the stage of the disease. Individualized support with follow-up leads to*:

- --- Positive and active engagement in life
- -- Health directed behaviour
- Self-monitoring and insight
- Health services navigation

We implemented continuous improvement projects that made it possible to increase by 50% the time committed to people touched by Parkinson's disease using the information and referral service.

Because we will all be caregivers


Parkinson Québec partnered with L'Appui pour les proches aidants d'aînés to develop the programming for National Caregiver Week, which was the combined effort of several organizations. Largely diffused through social media, this campaign generated numerous positive reactions from our online community.

Forum on caregiving

As an advocate for the Parkinson's community, Parkinson Québec participated in the provincial consultation held December 11 by the Minister Responsible for Seniors and Informal Caregivers, Marguerite Blais. It was an opportunity to express the reality of caregivers of people living with Parkinson's, particularly with regard to recognition and accessibility of resources. This forum will lead to a provincial policy for caregivers in 2019.

Virtual classes

Thanks to the financial support of L'Appui pour les proches aidants d'aînés, virtual classes provide genuine learning and result in inspiring discussions and help to equip caregivers. Offered in seven modules and accompanied by video capsules hosted by actor Louise Cardinal, the virtual classes cover different themes such as familiarization with Parkinson's disease or fall prevention. A panel of caregivers sharing their experience enhances the concepts discussed.

Accessible from all over Quebec

Liaison Parkinson

Liaison Parkinson is a new support service oriented toward empowerment. This proactive support program is a partnership between healthcare professionals and Parkinson Québec. Ten neurologists are already working with the program. It is intended to inform and offer support to people and families facing the disease, regardless of its stage.





Conference

Last October, the Cœur des Laurentides regional office of Parkinson Québec held the first regional conference on Parkinson's disease. Almost 200 participants came together to attend lectures and enjoy activities such as tango and boxing. The speakers invited to this event considerably contributed to making this conference a success.

Webinars

Webinars are a simple, easily accessible way to attend specialized lectures. Presented by experts, webinars are offered in French and in English. The varied topics allow participants to be informed and better equipped to face the disease.

Raising awareness for better support

Mindful that members of the Parkinson's community have different relationships with the disease, Parkinson Québec deploys various communication and awareness strategies. It ensures that a relationship of trust is established and maintained by distributing creative, accessible, accurate, bilingual information adapted to needs.

Positioning itself as the reference on Parkinson's disease in Quebec, Parkinson Québec builds partnerships with experts to stay on top of Parkinson's-related innovations and better approaches for distributing them.

Parkinson Québec is planning for the future by supporting the social engagement of the next generation. Close links established with students' groups from several universities contribute to Parkinson Québec's outreach



Rights and responsibilities of employees

Many people are employees when they are diagnosed with Parkinson's disease. It is therefore normal for them to have many questions on the impact of the disease. Developed in partnership with the Université de Montréal chapter of Pro Bono Students Canada, the new brochure "Rights of people living with Parkinson's at work" provides information on the laws, rights and responsibilities surrounding workplace discrimination on the basis of disability.

Neuro partnerships

Parkinson Québec continues its partnership with organizations supporting people living with a progressive neurological disease. This multiple partnership made it possible to contribute to a brief that will be presented to MNAs and filed at the National Assembly in February 2019, highlighting the issues related to access to accommodations, medication and caregivers.

A voice for the Parkinson's community

The new Minister Responsible for Seniors and Informal Caregivers spoke at the regional conference in Sainte-Adèle. It was also an opportunity for the Chair of Parkinson Québec to raise the issues affecting the group, particularly concerning funding, both regionally and provincially.

Parkinson's and Cannabis

With the legalization of cannabis and the use of medical cannabis, Parkinson Québec has updated its position based on scientific advances in the field. The frequently asked questions accompanying Parkinson Québec's position provide clarity on the impacts of cannabis consumption related to Parkinson's disease.

Funding

Based on philanthropic trends in recent years, Parkinson Québec is reviewing its financial development strategies and updating its practices to position itself as the organization of choice for donors. While emphasizing the organization's values and the impact of donations on the community, it highlights the testimony of people touched by Parkinson's in its various solicitation tools.

Surrounded by volunteers and experienced partners, Parkinson Québec is improving the effectiveness of its main fundraising events and working to increase the network of major partners.

Specific projects such as Liaison Parkinson and a urban garden project are also the subject of funding applications, particularly for grants or solicitation of philanthropic organizations.



Instants magiques

Inspired by the work of Anne McIsaac, photographer and artistic director living with Parkinson's disease, this event raised money in service of the mission and gave the 392 guests an experience centred around Parkinson's disease. The Parkinson Québec team was supported by a dedicated organizing committee, under honorary co-chairs Julie Henrichon, Fondation Henrichon Goulet and Jean-François Dagenais, BCF Business Law.



Our understanding of Parkinson's disease has evolved rapidly in recent years.

One of the major breakthroughs was the finding that the disease is heterogeneous, which means that each individual presents a different clinical profile. These observations led clinical institutions, particularly the International Parkinson and Movement Disorder Society to reconsider the definition of Parkinson's disease. This discovery comes with its share of challenges that include developing therapies applicable to a large number of patients and also identifying biomarkers that will provide diagnostic significance. Unfortunately, there is no biomarker for Parkinson's disease but the need is alarming.

All living cells, including blood cells, are able to release small cargo, called extracellular vesicles. We examined in the particles released by red blood cells and have observed that in stressful situations they are present in greater numbers in people living with Parkinson's disease and that they contain different proteins from control subjects. We are now working to validate these results on large cohorts of patients to make this tool available to clinicians who want a quick, reliable diagnosis, as well as to pharmaceutical companies who want to test the effectiveness of their new treatments. Through this work, we believe we have brought to light a diagnostic tool that is easy to use through a simple blood test.




